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## Instructions to Authors

Nagoya Medical Journal is published at least once a year by the Nagoya City University Graduate School of Medical Sciences and the Nagoya City University Medical Association.

The Journal accepts submissions of original research papers, short communications, case reports on medical research and its related fields. Invited articles, reviews, notes, symposium reports, hypothesis papers are also accepted.

It is important to confirm that your paper is not being simultaneously considered for any publications and a part of the submitted paper has not been previously published except for meeting abstracts or short proceedings.

In order to be considered for publication, all manuscripts must be submitted by electronic files (doc/docx and pdf) to editorial office (med-daigakuin@sec.nagoya-cu.ac.jp). Otherwise, three sets of original manuscript and illustrations should be directed to the Editorial Office, Nagoya Medical Journal, Nagoya City University Graduate School of Medical Sciences, Kawasumi1, Mizuho-ku, Nagoya467-8601, Japan.

Authors should take care for any suspected scientific misconduct (fabrication, falsification of data, double publication, duplicate submission, or plagiarism). If scientific misconduct is confirmed, the journal will contact the corresponding author's institution and the funding agencies. Nagoya Medical Journal will not consider publication of any papers by the authors for a period of at least 5 years.

Original research paper including the effect of all human studies must contain a statement of the approval of the appropriate ethics committee, performed in accordance with the ethical standards laid down in the 1964 Declaration of Helsinki and its later amendments. Animal experiments should be approved by the appropriate animal experimental committee, describing on the paper.

Manuscripts will be accepted for publication with the understanding that they will appear solely in Nagoya Medical Journal.

### Style of Manuscripts

Manuscripts should be written in English that should be checked by a competent and knowledgeable native speaker before submission. In case that the manuscript is judged for further editing by Editorial Board member, author (s) should pass through English check by a native speaker.

All manuscripts must be submitted by electronic files (doc/docx and pdf) which are printable on A4 paper (210 × 297mm) with left & right margins of 3 cm and top & bottom margins of 4 cm. Type all manuscript double - spaced, with font-size 12.

### Original Articles

Sections should be arranged in the following order: Title, Footnote, Summary (no more than 250

words), Introduction, Materials and Methods, Results, Discussion, Acknowledgments, References, Tables, and Figure Legends. The page number should be provided at the bottom of each page, starting from the title page as page-1. Results and Discussion can be combined in one section if necessary.

The title page should include full title, author's name (s), affiliation (s) and address (es) of all authors, running title (not more than 50 letters including the spaces), key words (five words or less), address for correspondence, and the total numbers of pages and figures.

Abbreviations should be spelled out in full on first mention in the text and be defined in Footnote on a separate sheet. Other footnotes may be used, with asterisks (\*, \*\*, --) at the bottom of the page to which they pertain.

Example: Footnote

Abbreviations used: DOC, dehydroxycholate; DNP,2,4-dinitrophenol; and SDS, sodium dodecyl sulfate.

## References

References should be numbered consecutively in the order they appear in the text. Identify references in text, tables, and legends by Arabic numerals in parentheses. Example: (3-5,8).

List all authors in References, but if the number is seven or more, give six followed by et al. Abbreviate journal titles as in Index Medicus. Examples:

1. DiFino SM, Lachant NA, Kirshner JJ, Gottlieb AJ. Adult idiopathic thrombocytopenic purpura: clinical findings and response to therapy. *Am J Med* 1980; 69: 430-442.
2. Whitehead M. The health divide: inequalities in health in the 1980s. London: London Health Education Council, 1987: 5-98.
3. Coleman CN, Tucker MA. Secondary Cancers. In: DeVita VT Jr, Hellman S, Rosenberg SA, eds. *Cancer: principles & practice of oncology*. 3rd ed. Vol.2. Philadelphia: J. B. Lippincott, 1989: 2181-2190.

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In citing author's name (s) in the text, describe the names up to two; if three or more, give the name of the senior author followed by et al. (e.g. Kosaka et al.).

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Each table should have a brief title and be typed double - spaced on a separate sheet. All tables must be numbered in the order of their citation in the text.

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“Figure” and “Figures” in the text or figure title should be abbreviated to “Fig.” and “Figs.”, respectively.

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
